### Brief Description

This course makes an introduction of the development of Greek art and architecture from the bronze age to the orientalizing period. In this course, not only the chronological and geographic context of Greek art and architecture, but also the basic concepts of dating, analyzing and interpreting archaeological evidence are demonstrated. The main periods include the middle bronze age, the late bronze age, the dark age, geometric Greece and the orientalizing period.
