Brief Description

Following the course ART 2C1 Greek Art and Architecture I, this course continues exploring the development of Greek art and architecture from Archaic Greece to the late Hellenistic Era. This course introduces the chronological and geographic context of Greek art and architecture as well as familiarizes students with basics concepts of dating, analyzing and interpreting archaeological evidence. The main periods include Archaic Greece, the period of transition, the high classical period, the forth century and the Hellenistic period.
